



Kisses and Knishes

It's March, and there aren't any major Jewish observances this month. So while we're readying our homes and ourselves for Passover, it might be fun to observe what's going on among our friends and neighbors.

Have you noticed that green is popping up all over? Yes, St. Patrick's Day is upon us, and the Irish and the Irish-at-heart are in the mood to celebrate. There will be parades in The Villages, and in Boston and New York – most of the cities in this country. On television, we'll be watching film classics such as *Finian's Rainbow*, *The Quiet Man*, and *Little Nellie Kelly*.

Perhaps we'll get in the mood by dining on Irish stew, or Irish soda bread, or corned beef and cabbage – all favorites at this time of year.


But what of Irish Jews? Well, if one looks up Irish Jews, you'll find mostly American people whose father was Irish and whose mother was Jewish. They include the very talented Kevin Kline and Matthew Broderick. But there is a group of a few thousand Jewish people whose forebears have lived in Ireland for centuries. Many of them are descendants of people who fled persecution in Spain during the Inquisition. Most of us will remember that, at one time, the Lord Mayor of Dublin was Jewish. Actually, a father and son both held that office.

Perhaps the most famous Irish Jew was Chaim Herzog, the son of a rabbi. He was born in Belfast but grew up in Dublin. His family moved to (then) Palestine. He studied law. A member of Haganah, he fought in the first Arab/Israeli War and became the head of military intelligence. He served as Israel's president from 1983 through 1993, the longest serving president.

There is a descendant of Irish Jews closer to Temple Shalom. Marvin Jasper's grandmother was Irish. She spoke Yiddish with a brogue!

Irish Soda Bread

In your electric mixer, mix 2 cups of flour, ½ cup of sugar, 1 teaspoon of baking soda, and ½ teaspoon of salt; add the zest of ½ of orange. Add ½ stick of cold, cubed unsalted butter. In a separate bowl, whisk 1 egg and ½ cup of buttermilk. Add the buttermilk and egg mixture to the flour all at once, and mix just until the dough comes together, then add 2/3 cup of currants that have been tossed with a teaspoon of flour. Turn the dough out onto a pastry cloth (or lint-free kitchen towel) that has been dusted with flour. Knead the dough ten or twelve



that has been dusted with flour. Knead the dough ten or twelve strokes. Place dough onto a parchment paper lined cookie sheet. Cut four slits into the top of the loaf, and then brush the loaf with buttermilk. Allow to rest for ½ hour. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 40 minutes. Allow to cool. Serve thin slices with butter and/or preserves. Enjoy!

ED-JEW-CATION: By Charlotte Newman

With the production of "Blazing Seniors: An Eastern Western" coming to Temple Shalom on April 11 & 12, what could be more appropriate than talking about Jewish cowboys and Indians? Yes, I said Indians! Between 1840 and 1880, the European Jewish population in America increased from 15,000 to around 250,000. During this same time, the United States expanded its size by one third, primarily in the west. With this expansion came opportunities, and there were many Jewish immigrants who took advantage of the boom. "So successful were the Jewish pioneers that by 1900, there wasn't a single settlement west of the Mississippi of any significance which had not had a Jewish mayor," says historian Kenneth Libo. "This includes Deadwood, Dodge City, and Tombstone." It may surprise you to know that the O.K. Corral was in a town which had a Jewish mayor. In fact, Wyatt Earp's common-law wife was Jewish, and Wyatt was buried in a Jewish cemetery to be near her.

The Jewish pioneers became miners, gunfighters, cattle punchers, merchants, doctors, and lawmen...and Indians! Solomon Bibo, a wagon driver from Prussia, transported merchandise from Ft. Whipple and traded livestock and farming equipment with an Acoma Indian settlement on the top of a mesa. The chief of the tribe took a shine to Bibo; Bibo took a shine to the chief's granddaughter, and he married her. Bibo became the first non-Indian governor of a North American Indian tribe. Their children were raised Jewish, and the family moved to San Francisco to live among Jews when the boys were of bar mitzvah age. There was even a circuitriding mohel, Dr. John Eisner, who traveled on horseback to Colorado, New Mexico, Nebraska, and Wyoming, and left records which reveal he carried out 169 circumcisions from 1887 to 1905 (no tomahawks were used for the ritual!)

Julius Meyer is a frontier legend. Another Prussian, he wound up in Nebraska in 1867. During a buffalo hunt he was captured by Sioux and lived with the tribe for several years. He was known by the Indians as Curly-Headed White Chief, a tribute to his black curly hair and his honesty. He spoke six Indian languages and served as an Indian interpreter to

Congress and as an Indian agent. It is recorded that many Jewish pioneer men could not get the Jewish women back east to join them in the wild west, and so they married gentile women, including Indians.

What is a Wild West story without a gunslinger? Old West legends has Jim Levy, the Jewish gunfighter. Levy was born in Ireland but migrated to Nevada in the 1860's. He originally was a miner until he got mixed up in a gunfight in which he was a spectator. He testified that Michael Casev had fired the first shot that killed Tom Gasson, and that the shot was not fired in self-defense. Gasson bequeathed, on his deathbed, \$5,000 to the avenger of his death. This provoked a shoot-out between Levy and Casey, which Levy won, thus collecting the \$5,000. Subsequently, Levy gave up mining and became a professional "regulator" and gambler. He was described by a newspaper as a "pistoliferous gambler. Though he was accused of murder more than once, he was never convicted. Jim Levy met his end on June 5, 1882, in Arizona. At the Fashion Saloon he got into an argument with faro dealer John Murphy, and they agreed to a duel. But then Murphy heard about Levy's shooting skills and opted to ambush him instead. As Levy was leaving the Palace Hotel, unarmed, he was attacked by Murphy and his two friends and killed.

Mainly, however, the Jewish pioneers were merchants, the most famous being Levi Strauss, who followed the gold miners to furnish them with tents and other merchandise and wound up making them overalls and pants out of the material he carried. Mostly there were mom & pop operations wherever populations sprung up. Legend has it that the capitol of Montana, Helena, was named for a woman that provided wonderful cooking for the miners there; her name was Helena Goldberg!

So giddyup, you Yiddish cowboys and cowgirls, and buy tickets to the rollicking vild, vild vest show, "Blazing Seniors," coming to your own Temple Shalom in April. Until next time, *Happy Trails to You!*

Shelly says that their cars will never know the inside of the garage because Les uses that space for his workshop.

The Roths have been married for 40 years. They have two daughters, Heidi and Cindy, and three grandchildren – Mya, Lauren, and Lexi. Every couple of months Shelly and Les travel back up north to visit with their family and spend time with their young grandchildren. It was a TV ad that inspired the couple to leave home and hearth in NY and move to Central Florida, providing Les, who was tired of shoveling snow, the final impetus to move to The Villages. They have been here for a year and reside in Pinellas Village Shelly majored in speech pathology and worked with Down syndrome kids, helping them learn to communicate. But she also tried a few nontraditional ventures. At one time, she helped repossess trucks. She started a low-carb business during the craze. On a whim, Shelly opened "The Sweet Shopee," a candy store selling "pick-ityourself" bulk candy, and an ever changing array

of custom made gift items. She remembers it being a lot of hard work and fun, but "not as sweet as it sounded." All that ended when the Roths did a sixmonth stint in Southlake, TX, an enclave in the middle of nowhere, where the nearest store was a "feed and tackle," and the closest semblance of Judaism was one-and-a-half hours away.

Les worked for Citibank in systems and software development for 27 years. When he retired, Les got involved in land development, owning and racing horses, and flying. He also found time to serve as president of the Manetto Hill Jewish Center where he spearheaded a Torah refurbishment project that made over \$20,000 for the
